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# Academic Writing Course If you need it, you can have it at ETAG

Developing Writing Skills is a 20-hour course where participants learn the basics of academic writing. Starting with the paragraph and its various types, students go through brainstorming techniques: such as free writing, outlining and using tree diagrams. Essential organization of paragraph construction (topic sentence, supporting sentences and concluding sentences) are then reviewed and practiced. Paragraph coherence (transitional devices), cohesion, unity and completeness are used next and students then move from paragraph writing to essay writing. Students then develop topic sentences to thesis statements and into introductory paragraphs using hooks, anecdotes, questions, quotes and statistics. Next paragraph supporting sentences are further devel-
oped into body paragraphs with a topic sentence, major and minor supporting sentences with concrete support and concluding sentences with further transitional usage. Devices for forming concluding paragraphs such as summarizing, making a suggestion, giving an opinion or a prediction are then investigated. All these skills are developed by students analyzing sample and
 model paragraphs and parts of the essay, and then with group and individual writing exercises. The students at the end of the course will be able to write well-organized paragraphs and a well-developed process and comparison/contrast essay.
